Like any commercial property, the monetary value of the chapter house is dependent almost entirely upon the income that it can generate. This is true even with not-for-profit organizations. If we cannot keep the house full of willing renters, its value will suffer.

To combat this, building owners almost always reach a point where “deferred maintenance” must be addressed, usually in the form of a renovation project to bring a property back to its market value in terms of occupancy, rental rates and physical appearance. Brothers, we have reached that point with the Iota Chapter House of Pi Kappa Phi. Recognizing this, the Alumni Board of Directors has secured refinancing of the current debt at very favorable terms, which has allowed us to raise funds in order to make needed repairs and physical improvements to our chapter house.

The effort will address a comprehensive list of immediately needed repairs, replacement of wear and tear items, and significant enhancements to the facility. We will be looking at the house systems, such as mechanical,

electrical and plumbing, to make long-term repairs and correct issues that have lingered for some time. We also will be making some changes to accommodate the active

brotherhood’s plans to revamp the dining system, with upgrades to the main kitchen and a new, common, “break room-style” kitchen.

We will be able to make many significant improvements with the refinancing funds that are now available. However, it only will represent about half the total value of improvements that have been identified by the Alumni Board of Directors and the current chapter leadership. We will, of course, tackle the most pressing issues first, but we also will need to aggressively pursue further funding from alumni and other sources to continue the effort.

Much of the work to the chapter house is planned to be completed by the fall semester. We do hope many Iota alumni will drop by the house this fall to visit with the active brotherhood and to see the improvements.

## Pi Kappa Phi Brothers Are HEROs

### Local Organization Helping Children With AIDS Receives Special Iota Chapter Attention

Pi Kappa Phi has been making a positive impact on the Atlanta, GA community. One of their biggest recent contributions has been working with an organization called GT HEROs (Hearts Everywhere Reaching Out). This organization helps children infected and affected by AIDS and HIV through quality-of-life programs.

Nine members of the active chapter are involved in the philanthropy, and three hold leadership positions on the executive board. **Mike Roche**, Greek Affairs executive member and Pi Kappa Phi chapter president says, "We see this as the beginning of a partnership that Pi Kappa Phi will develop through the years, and it is a great start after one semester."

Pi Kappa Phi teamed with GT HEROs this past fall when Roche was looking for ways for the fraternity to get more involved on campus, as well as to give back to the community. When he learned of GT HEROs, it seemed to be a perfect fit. GT HEROs was excited for the chance to team with Pi Kappa Phi to make their events bigger and better.

The Fall Festival is a chance for HERO children to visit Georgia Tech for a day of fun with a rock climbing wall, an obstacle course, face painting, and more. The spring event "Hanging With HEROs" invites children to play sports and hang out with the Georgia Tech basketball team. The children get to grill out, tour football and basketball locker rooms, and get autographs from basketball players. There also is a semi-annual benefit party to raise awareness for HIV and AIDS, and a year-long effort to raise money and awareness for HERO.

A "Road Rules" event helps to raise money for GT HEROs by taking members to the streets to raise money for the organization, and the "Paint the Town Red" event fundraises at Midtown Tavern. GT HEROs also looked to Greek Organizations to participate in a Date Auction event at the end of the year, where campus leaders and athletes were auctioned off.

Pi Kappa Phi plans to continue its contributions to the organization, making them bigger and better. We will host a block party at the chapter house during the first week of school this fall, and the whole campus will be invited. The chapter will focus on inviting freshmen to get them interested in the event. "It will be great

publicity for the chapter and a great time as well," says Mike Roche.

**Nicholas O'Connell** says that one of the best parts of being involved in GT HEROs as a member of Pi Kappa Phi is being able to promote the Greek community as a whole. "Many of the leadership positions are filled by Greek leaders on campus and we are doing our best to help lift the stigma that has been placed on us," he says.

The brothers also agree that one of the most rewarding aspects of the involvement for Pi Kappa Phi brothers has been interacting with the HERO children. "I had a ton of fun at 'Hangin' With HEROs.' It was a great experience hanging out with the kids. You learn a lot about how these kids are just trying to live there lives, but they have been affected with such a terrible thing. It is a joy to help them," explains

**Dan Agius**. He adds, "It is amazing how great of an impact you can have by playing basketball or catch with a little kid. You are there to show them a good time, and you can't help but have fun."

Roche's favorite memory of GT HEROs also was at "Hangin With Heros," where he was able to interact with the children for the first time: "It was a lot of fun because I was able to hang out and play sports with them on a Sunday afternoon."

Involvement in the philanthropy has been rewarding to the brothers in more way than one. "We see it as a way to keep our philanthropy involvement going year round and gain valuable leadership experience," says Roche.

The impact that the Pi Kappa Phi brothers and HERO has made is deeper than simply showing the children a good time. "The best part of being involved in HERO is knowing that everything I do is making a difference for these children. They are bright and hopeful about their future. That is what HERO wants to preserve and reinforce. We do our best to see that these children succeed in life," says **Nicholas O'Connell**.

The organization is designed to help children whose families have fallen through the cracks of society in the past. "When I meet with some of the parents of the children, there is this unmistakable glint of hope in their eyes. Many of the parents live well below the poverty line, and to see that look in their eyes, when their children get to experience all these things that they had never thought possible, is very motivating," says O'Connell.

As the partnership with Pi Kappa Phi and GT HEROs continues, the brothers will have fun while growing awareness for the organization and the cause throughout the community. "We are looking forward to the fall, where most of the fundraising and other events take place, so the rest of the brotherhood can join in the fun," says Mike Roche.
